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Henry Highland Garnet was an American-born abolitionist, minister, educator, orator, and diplomat. His final life achievement was his time as U.S. Ambassador to Liberia, Africa. (*Memories and Adventures*)

Kumar Sri Sir Ranjitsinhji Vibhaji II was an Indian cricketer and Maharaja of Nawanagar (present day Jamnagar), making him a fine choice for Asia. (*"Complimentary and Farewell Dinner to H.H. Ranjitsinhji Maharaja Jam Sahib of Navanagar"*)

John Monash was a civil engineer and military commander in Australia. (*Memories and Adventures, Wanderings of a Spiritualist*)

Victoria. This gracious lady's influence spanned many continents, but we will keep her in her home turf of Europe.

Kipling is for Caroline and Rudyard Kipling. They represent North America because ACD stayed with them in Vermont in 1894. (*Memories and Adventures*)

Reader. ACD wrote of a Miss Reader who was a medium for a circle sitting in



Uruguay. We can assume that she was comfortable on more than one plane of existence, but for our purposes she will serve as the representative for South America. (*The Edge of the Unknown*)

The eighth contestant is a special case with no particular continental association. Many of you will be familiar with Unfortunate Pony's perennial attempts at the Cup.
